My dear Dini,

I am sorry that I have taken so long to reply to your letter which I was very glad to receive. As you know, I am in this trial about prison conditions, and the trial has been taking up all my time lately.

I have written to friends of mine overseas about getting penfriends for you. By now I hope that you will have heard from some of them. Will you let me know when you do hear from them? Later you will also be receiving books from overseas.

Last week I posted to you another batch of books which I hope you will find interesting. I also sent, in a separate parcel, a set of girls' annuals for Miliswa. Will you please give these to her. I have noted what you wrote about the sort of books you prefer: I have ordered a set of classics for you and these will be posted to you soon. Please let me know when all these books reach you and whether you like them. I have also sent you, by registered post, a set of two books dealing with people in other countries. Will you let me know whether you and Miliswa like these? If you do, I shall arrange for you to receive a different one dealing with different countries every month.

I am enclosing postal orders to the value of R2.50. Of this, R1.50 is for you, and 50c each for Dedani and Dalindyabo. Will you please see that they get it? In a letter I received from your Father this week, he said that he is very anxious for all of you to start saving money. Can you buy money boxes in Leribe for yourself and the twins? If you can, please buy some small ones and whenever you can, put a few cents away for the future. If you cannot buy such things there, let me know and I shall send them to you.

I told Jenny that you had sent your greetings: she gave a big smile and asked me to send you her regards.

I hope you and the other children are well. Please give them my love. Will you ask Miliswa to write to me.

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
