Dear Benji

Concerning health I am alright wishing you the same in London. Shortly after my arrival in Baghdad I wrote you a letter but until now I haven't heard from you.

As you know that I have insatiable appetite for information on PAC I request you to help me secure a video tape of the funeral of Bob from SATV as I learnt that SATV was there. If you can contact Ronald Segal the former Editor of Africa South I wish you to get from him the press cuttings on the debate between Peter Raboroko and Duma Nokwe after the launching of the Decisive Final Positive Action Campaign against pass laws on the 21st March 1960. I wonder if it will be possible for you to get from archives World cuttings with statements of Africanists prior to the inauguration of the P.A.C. in 1959.

My brother I trust you that if it is possible you will get these records for me. When we meet I shall show you a beautiful file which my wife made for me wherein

all press cuttings on the liberation struggle have been photocopied and put together to enable both my son Khanyisa (meaning let there be light) and Tando my daughter Tando (meaning love) to find them accessible when they grow up and study true history.

I don't claim to have everything but I brought together cuttings of Lembede, Madzanga, Bob P.K. launching of the campaign, all-in African Conference of Nelson Mandela and his stay at home, peasants uprising in the Transkei in 1960, Sabata Dalindyebo's row with Bantu Affairs Department officials in Transkei, Zeph's claim on security police for assaulting him, Pokela's sending to jail, Pokela's visit to the United States, reports of my discharge from the Bethal Trial, EPC, U.N. decision on release of Zeph and Nelson and the arrest of Enoch Zulu the second-in-command in Azanian People's Liberation Army of the PAC. If I would have managed to raise money, all this material would be incorporated into the PAC Film which has been started by Oxford Film Company. However I am confident one day we shall have money and people will be stunned in hearing the true facts about the struggle.

Benji in my previous letter I have asked you to help me get some photocopies of some press cuttings. I shall be happy to get a reply from you.
