

1. **Dr. Molema (Barolong) Constitution of the Council** suggested that some fixed and general system be adopted for electing delegates to this council. It ~~was~~<sup>is</sup> unsatisfactory to leave the matter entirely in the hands of the Chiefs as is done by the present nomination method of nomination. Many able persons were apt to be left out. The Speaker proposes that election by the tribe should be uniformly adhered to so as to get the best brains in every tribe and make the deliberation of the council more orderly and successful. (unanimously adopted)
2. **Procedure that matters for discussion in the council** are sprung upon delegates and the Resident Commissioner by other delegates and after a short interval of consideration are adopted and passed. Suggest that such matters should be communicated to the Resident Commissioner who in turn should communicate them to the Chiefs about two months before the sitting of the council to allow of a thorough discussion in various tribal kgotlas, or alternatively that matters brought up in one council meeting should not be passed until the succeeding council meeting the following year. (Supported by Chief Isang) & adopted unanimously by the delegates).

3. **Record of Minutes** ~~Face-spe~~ the speaker finally suggests that the minutes of the Advisory council meetings be printed every year in an abbreviated form, resolutions being printed in full. In this way it will be possible to make amendments in laws before they are proclaimed. (unanimously adopted.)
